HVAC/Electrical Project Completed Building Closed September 19-20

House of Hope's HVAC, fire safety, and electrical project is now completed!

On September 19 and 20, most of the staff will return to offices in the west end of the building. Members of the Music Staff will remain in their offices in the East Wing. The church offices and building will be closed on September 19 and 20 to accommodate the relocation of phone extensions and electronic equipment and to move office furniture and set up offices. The library books and art will return later in the fall when people and programs are more settled.

In addition to the Hearing Loop, the House, Property, and Insurance Committee is looking at other sound/hearing improvements and has to plan for some roof repairs made evident by this wet summer.

This fall, we welcome two new tenants to House of Hope. Greater Twin Cities Youth Symphonies will be renting the Great Hall for rehearsal space on Tuesday and Thursday nights after office hours. In addition, Meadowlark School, a part of the Association of Waldorf Schools, will be renting Room 11 on the second floor of the East Wing during the day. The school is called a "microschool" with a class of second graders.

House of Hope welcomes Dr.
Kate Bowler to our Sunday Series
on Sunday, November 3 at 2 p.m.
Kate Bowler, Ph.D., a 4X *New York Times* bestselling author,
podcast host, and professor at
Duke University, brings a unique
perspective to her work. She
delves into the cultural narratives

we construct around success, suffering, and our capacity for change. In a world fraught with challenges and uncertainties, Kate Bowler stands out as a beacon of hope and humor, guiding others through their darkest moments with her resilience, wisdom, and infectious optimism.

As a speaker, Kate has a remarkable ability to ignite a spark of transformation within each listener. Her talks inspire them to embrace their vulnerabilities, discover purpose, and approach life with a newfound sense of meaning. To hear Kate Bowler speak is to embark on a journey of self-discovery and personal growth, an experience that leaves a lasting imprint on hearts and minds.

At age 35, she was unexpectedly diagnosed with Stage IV cancer, causing her to think in different terms about the research and beliefs she had been studying. She penned *The New York Times* bestselling memoir, *Everything Happens for a Reason (and Other Lies I've Loved)*, which tells the story of her struggle to understand the personal and intellectual dimensions of the American belief that all tragedies are tests of character.

On her popular podcast, *Everything Happens*, Kate speaks with people like Malcolm Gladwell, Tig Notaro, Bryan Stevenson, Minka Kelly, Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby, and Katie Couric about what wisdom and truth they've uncovered during difficult circumstances. Kate's work has received widespread media attention from The Today Show, *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, and NPR. Her TED talk has been viewed more than 10 million times.

A Note from Phil

"In the sharing of the meal we give concrete expression to our gratitude. We catch a taste of heaven."

I stumbled upon this gem from P. Travis Kroeker in a collection of essays by the late bell hooks, entitled Belonging: A Culture of Place. Hooks wrote this as she returned to the land where she was born, Kentucky, to teach at Berea College. She recounts her wanderings throughout the country, searching for a sense of belonging that pays "...tribute to the past as a resource that can serve as a foundation for us to revision and renew our commitment to the present, to making a world where all people can live fully and well, where everyone can belong."

Our country, our world, and our local community of St. Paul ache for belonging. Inundated as we have become with breaking news about doomsday scenarios, it is easy to lose sight of the very specific ways we and so many in our immediate community are working toward places where even more of us can belong. We continue our practice of building a more beloved community: in worship and Sunday School and through our giving to sustain our building and programs. But this fall's enrichment and education opportunities offer specific glimpses at work being done—among us and around us—that deepens and widens belonging in our midst.

Celebrating Rally Sunday on September 8 is a staple of belonging for this congregation. Ice cream truck, picnic lunch, bouncy mazes, and a renewed sense of possibility will be on hand...and maybe even a dunk tank? In October, our fall Sunday Series will highlight the work of our Presbyterian denomination, as well as local, state, national and international initiatives moving for reparations for indigenous peoples, American descendants of chattel slavery. House of Hope members will have the opportunity to join the Sacred Sites tour, hosted by Rev. Jim Bear Jacobs of the Minnesota Council of Churches, that visits nearby locations sacred to the Dakota people. In early November, 4-time New York Times bestselling author Kate Bowler will speak on her experiences as an unexpected cancer survivor and authentic hope found amid despair. And both youth and intergenerational family retreats offer intentional times for rest and reflection.

Interspersed throughout will be Sunday Enrichment speakers addressing anti-hate work; skills for listening and connecting across deep differences; local ballot initiatives that often get lost in big election cycles; and hope-filled advocacy for people too often overlooked in our justice system.

We look forward to pulling up chairs with everyone around the table at House of Hope, and catching a taste of heaven.

Handbell Choirs at House of Hope

The Handbell program at House of Hope is the second oldest musical group and celebrates its 45th anniversary



beginning this fall. Join a group and experience the art of handbell ringing!

The **Bells of Hope** rehearse weekly during the program year for 90 minutes and ring musical offerings once each month. Music reading skills are required, but bell technique is taught at rehearsals.

The **Sounds of Hope** meets weekly for 20 minutes each Wednesday and offers music for worship every other month. This is a great way to refresh music reading skills - bell ringing technique is taught in rehearsals.

Sacred Bells is an ensemble that ring patterns – no music reading skills are required! The group rings about 5 times a year, meets early on a Sunday morning to learn the patterns, then accompanies a hymn or prayers in the service.

Bright Hope for Tomorrow



We are grateful for those who have made a pledge or gift to our Capital Campaign!

187 households have pledged or have given \$4,236,055 to the capital campaign. This includes 162 pledges totaling \$4,142,129 and 25 non-pledged gifts of \$93,926.

We have spent around \$10 million to date on this project, funded in part by a PILP Loan and additional funds from the Endowment. Please consider a pledge or gift if you have not done so already.

The Houses of Hope Fund at Work in St. Paul

Two new affordable residences are now open thanks in part to funding from The Houses of Hope Fund.
Residents have been moving into their new homes in the new Highland Bridge development. The Houses of Hope Fund made multi-year grants totaling \$24,000 to Common Bond for The Lumen and \$30,000 to Project for Pride in Living (PPL) for Restoring Waters in support of these new affordable housing units.

Restoring Waters, a Project for Pride in Living property, is a supportive housing residence for more than 60 individuals and small families, and will provide the foundation for every person to heal, recover, and build a more stable and harmonious future. All residents will have access to a variety of supportive professionals, including case managers, peer support specialists, and other health specialists to provide information, support, referrals, and advocacy as needed.

The Lumen, a project of Common Bond, provides 60 units of housing for seniors. Residents are ages 62 and older who earn 30 percent or less of the Area Median Income (AMI). A project-based Section 8 subsidy allows residents to pay 30 percent of their income in rent. Seven units will be reserved for formerly homeless seniors.

The Houses of Hope Fund was created as a part of the 150th Anniversary of House of Hope in 1999. This dedicated fund was created for the purpose of partnering with existing agencies and non-profit organizations to upgrade, improve, construct, and promote affordable housing for low to moderate income individuals and families in the neighborhood of the House of Hope Church (especially to the north and northeast), the City of St. Paul, and the East metropolitan area. Since 2000, over \$3 million in grants have been awarded.
