

House of Hope Calls Senior Pastor and Head of Staff: Rev. Dr. E. Scott Jones

Staff.

Rev. Dr. E. Scott Jones has served as Senior Minister at First Central Congregational Church in Omaha, Nebraska from 2010 to present. He earned his PhD and Master's in Philosophy from the University of Oklahoma, following his BA in Religion and Philosophy from Oklahoma Baptist University. He is a two-time alumnus of the Yale Writers' Workshop. Scott also drew from his philosophical expertise to teach in the Philosophy Department at Creighton University.

Prior to his current call, Scott served as Pastor of the Cathedral of Hope in Oklahoma City, where he also wrote a column for the *Oklahoma Gazette*. His earlier ministry included roles as Associate Pastor and Youth and College Minister at churches in Arkansas and Texas. In the community, Scott has been actively involved in social justice work, serving with the anti-racism organization Voices United, co-authoring the Heartland Proclamation, and coordinating Nebraska's #ReadyToMarry campaign for marriage equality. While Scott finds fulfillment in various pursuits including hiking, reading, gardening, and travel, he considers being a father to his son Sebastian, age 9, the greatest joy of his life.

The vote of House of Hope's members in attendance at the meeting was 197 in favor of calling Rev. Dr. Scott Jones, two no votes, and three abstentions. His tentative start date at House of Hope is mid-May.

A Note from Phil

Community Care

"You are the salt of the earth..."
-Matthew 5:13

The season of Lent (the 40 days excluding Sundays—between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday) has traditionally been a time for Christians to add a spiritual practice, or to remove an obstacle to spiritual practice. Like rampant consumerism has with Christmas, Lent has—to borrow a current turn of phrase taken on a bit too much of a self-care vibe. Don't misread me: I think adding personal practice, or abstaining from an unhelpful habit, is spiritually significant. I think it is modeled and encouraged throughout the Bible and centuries of Christian practice. And it always has the potential to lead us to deeper engagement with our inner lives.

But it cannot stop there.

We are not called to be salt to ourselves: enhancing the flavor of our personal well-being without regard for others. Nor are we called to be salt only to those we know, like, and agree with: making ourselves comfortable with the flavor of our chosen communities. We are salt of the earth: all creation, all that God has made and called good, including that and those we wish weren't part of our reality.

The spiritual practices we choose to undertake, or the habits we choose to abstain from, or the resolution

to keep on keeping on without changing anything in our lives at present: if these do not center the care of our wider community; if they are not concerned with those in our midst who are marginalized, being erased or attacked, stripped of dignity, made to be hungry or homeless; they are nothing more, in the words of the apostle Paul, than noisy cymbals or clanging gongs.

Where do you see community care happening in this congregation? If you are salt of the earth, how will your presence add depth to that care?

Where do you see community care happening in this neighborhood? If this congregation is the salt of the earth, how will our presence broaden and deepen that care?

Where do you see community care happening in our region, our state, among and across our denominations and religious traditions? If Christians are the salt of the earth, how will our presence enhance the work of justice, peace, hope, and healing that is global in scale?

"...the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve." May these words from the gospels of Matthew and Mark guide us through this Lenten season, showing us where in the world we might make our communities places of care, compassion, hope, and love. Amen.

Well, your Nominating Committee has been meeting now for close to two months. We have reviewed nomination forms, talked with clergy and other church leadership, poured over the directory and the rosters of those currently serving, and prayed together for guidance and clarity. We are working to balance the needs of each board and of the various committees with the need for institutional knowledge {returning volunteers} and fresh perspectives {first-time Deacons, Elders, Trustees}. There are a lot of details to consider before we start calling individuals to ask them {you?!} to serve on one of the boards. That's our responsibility, after all!

What do we ask of you? If you receive a call from a member of the Nominating Committee, we truly hope that you will say "Yes!" Or, more realistically, "I have some questions and need a few days to think and pray about this."

Each of us on the committee, every Deacon you see on Sunday morning,

each Trustee and Elder, said "yes" for a reason. Many of those "yes" responses came along with some trepidation, with concerns about time commitments, with uncertainty about what comes next. But they—we!—did say yes, and House of Hope is blessed by their willingness to put their gifts to work through the grace of God.

Within our faith tradition, we talk about discernment. The Oxford **English Dictionary offers this** definition for discernment within a faith tradition: "The ability to make sound judgments in spiritual matters; the exercise of this ability; spiritual understanding or insight." The PNC went through an intense, complex process to guide their sound judgment in calling a new pastor to our congregation. The Nominating Committee undertakes an annual process to seek spiritual understanding of the needs and gifts of the church in order to call {literally on the phone and spiritually to serve} fellow congregants.

Then, if you get such a call, we ask you to self-discern, to exercise your good judgment and spiritual insight, to determine whether this is the right time—or the "good enough" time—for you to say "yes."

I am pleased to announce that we have hired a highly skilled professional to become the new Executive Director of this developing organization, Madeline Cieslak. She brings a wealth of experience and a proven record in leading and developing nonprofit organizations. We are truly fortunate to have such a talented and gifted person joining our staff. She has initially been hired as a part of the church staff, and her salary will be paid for now out of the 2025 operating budget. Over the next few months she will work with our governing boards and other volunteers to get the Foundation organized and incorporated. Then, when this is completed, she will be the first employee of the new Foundation.

With over 25 years of experience in community arts education and nonprofit leadership, Madeline brings a deep commitment to fostering the arts as a vehicle for education, connection, and service.

A St. Paul native, Madeline has long been an advocate for the arts and a passionate community builder. She is also a former member and section leader of the Motet Choir, strengthening her deep ties to the House of Hope community and its mission.

For 17 years, Madeline served as the Executive Director of St. Joseph's School of Music (SJSM), providing visionary leadership, strategic direction, and program development while cultivating a vibrant community of artists, teachers, staff, and volunteers. Under her leadership, SJSM thrived, staying true to its faith-based mission of making high-quality music education accessible

to all. One of her most significant accomplishments was overseeing the school's 2022 relocation, leading the planning and project management of the re-design and renovations within the historic Richards Gordon School. Most recently, she successfully orchestrated the merger of SJSM with the St. Paul Conservatory of Music, broadening the school's programming, funding opportunities, and community impact. Madeline is a co-founder of the Minnesota Bach Ensemble, where she served as its first Managing Director, laying the groundwork for the ensemble's continued success. Prior to her career in nonprofit leadership, Madeline spent 15 years as a professional classical singer, performing across the country in both opera and concert. Madeline holds a B.A. in Music and French from Wellesley College, with additional studies at the Université and Conservatoire d'Aix-Marseille in France. She earned a Master of Music in Voice from the University of Minnesota, followed by a Post-Graduate Diploma from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and nonprofit executive education at the

Earth Care Congregations initially commit to an Earth Care Pledge, developed by the Social Justice and Peacemaking Unit of the Presbyterian Church (USA), to care for God's creation in areas of worship, education, facilities, and outreach. Our Session affirmed the pledge in November 2019. Each February we apply for recertification by reporting on our actions in these four areas over the past year as well as the progress we hope to make in the coming year. March Food Drive



1 in 9 people in Minnesota have limited or uncertain access to adequate food. You can make a difference during the March Food Drive as we support the food pantries at Hallie Q. Brown Community Center and Neighborhood House. Rising food costs and inflation are drastically

affecting families in our community. More people than ever are turning to food pantries for support, and the truth is, food banks are strained to keep up with the increased need. Here are updated facts about hunger in Minnesota:

- Feeding America reports that 537,890 Minnesotans are facing hunger. 34% of these individuals are under the age of 18.
- Minnesotans made an estimated record-breaking 9 million visits to food shelves in 2024. This is up 20% from the previous record of 7.5 million set in 2023.
- Annual visits to food shelves are now 150% higher than they were prior to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our March Food Drive is vitally important as we help the 1 in 8 hungry children, or 1 in 9 people overall. Food insecurity makes children uneasy, stressed, and unable to concentrate. Parents worry they can't fulfill basic food needs for their family.
